Crime is down in the Amani Neighborhood



Between 2015 and 2019, the reduction in crime was greater in Amani than in the city as a whole.

Overall Property Crime is down in Amani by 41%

Violent Crime is DOWN in ALL of the hotspots in Amani



Volent crime data was obtained from the DCS Fact table and counts distinct incidents of rape, robbery and aggravated assault for the time period of January 1-December 31, 2015-2019, Homicide and non-fatal shooting data was obtained from the OMAP Homicide and Non-Fatal Shooting databases and counts victims for the same time period. The number listed inside the parentheses indicates the count of violent crime incidents for each respective year [January 1-December 31, 2015-2019] within a 25ft buffer of each segment's (A-F) vicinity. The blue contour line illustrated on the map represents a moderate to high concentration of violent crimes for the time period of January 1-December 31, 2018. The blue density layer illustrated on the map represents violent crime incidents for accurate within the Amani boundary for the time period of January 1-December 31, 2019. Dark blue shaded areas represent a high concentration of violent crime in Amani that includes incidents of homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault.

What was the purpose of the survey? To learn what residents of the Amani neighborhood think about:

- Neighborhood conditions
- Crime and Safety
- Police legitimacy

- To see if things change over time
 - Baseline (2017/18)
 - Now (November and December 2020)

Neighborhood Conditions

- The issue of greatest concern continues to be **trash and litter on the sidewalk.**
- All other areas showed growing concern which may suggest heightened resident awareness.

Crime and Safety

- On most issues, a greater percent of residents are concerned.
- In a few areas, (shooting, robbery drug dealers, murder, and speeding/wreckless driving) concern decreased slightly.

Where do residents see police in Amani?

- Residents are most likely to see police driving through on patrol or making a traffic stop.
- The greatest increases (up 17 percentage points)was seeing police on foot or on bike patrol and seeing police having friendly conversations with people (up 13%).

How residents feel when they see police

- There was an increase in the percent of residents who feel proud, relieved and secure when they see police in Amani.
- However, the percent feeling afraid and uneasy also increased during this time.

Police Performance

- Roughly one-third of Amani residents rate police as doing a good or very good job.
- Residents' rating of police improved in all four areas.
- The greatest increase was in dealing with problems that really concern residents.

Residents are willing to help

- Nearly 90% of Amani residents indicated they are likely to call the police to report a crime or report dangerous or suspicious behavior.
- All three areas showed substantial increases.
